In guided reading groups we have reviewed and practiced strategies for identifying main idea and theme, as well as strategies to determine the meaning of unknown words.

We continue to emphasize the importance of using evidence to support our thinking in all of our writing. In addition, we have explored different literary devices that authors use to make their writing more descriptive and interesting, such as similes, metaphors, onomatopoeia, alliteration and personification. We have been on the look out for these devices in books and poetry that we have read and shared.

We are also excited to have published our personal narrative stories and look forward to a publishing party next week!

NYS Education Department Tips for State Exams

- Present a positive attitude toward the tests. Let your child know that you have confidence in his or her abilities. Explain that some of the test questions may be difficult and that it does not matter if other students finish earlier. Let your child know it is okay to proceed at his or her own pace.
- Be sure your child is physically prepared on the day of the test. Taking a test requires a student's full attention, so your child should have a good night's sleep before the test. Make sure your child has a healthy breakfast and a nutritious lunch.
