

Easter is a very popular holiday which takes place on the second Sunday of April. This year it took place on April 8<sup>th</sup>.

Easter is the central feast in the Christian liturgical year, although not only Christians celebrate Easter. It marks the end of Lent, a forty day period of sacrifice and prayer. Easter is the oldest Christian holiday and the most important day of the church year. The word "Easter's" origin is not certain but is most likely derived from Estre, an Anglo-Saxon goddess. Another way Easter is interpreted is as a family holiday. In some families Easter is celebrated by coloring eggs as a family then the "Easter bunny" hides the eggs around the house for the kids to find. These are all very common Easter customs and were incorporated from springtime fertility. The eggs are a symbol of joy and celebration. ### Passover: Jewish festival of freedom

Passover, also known as Pesach, is the Jewish festival of freedom. It is held every spring to celebrate the exodus of the Jews from Egypt, where they had been Slaves, about 3200 years ago.

Passover is the eight day observance commemorating the freedom and exodus of the Israelites (Jewish slaves) from Egypt during the reign of the Pharaoh Ramses II.

A time of family gatherings and lavish meals called Seders, the story of Passover is retold through the reading of the *Haggadah*. With its special foods, songs, and customs, the Seder is the focal point of the Passover celebration.

Passover begins on the 15th day of the Jewish month of Nissan. As the Jewish day begins at sundown the night before, for the year 2012, the first night of Passover was April 6th.
