

The Catcher in the Rye

The protagonist is a misunderstood teenager named Holden Caulfield. He is perceived as some stupid rebel but is actually very deep and caring. During his last days at Pencey Prep, Holden gets fed up with the school and all the "phonies" in it. Since there are only a few days until holiday break, he decided to go to the city and "chill." Finally he gets very depressed and misses his sister Phoebe who he absolutely adores. Holden has always dreamed of running away, but can he really make it on his own, without his family and especially his beloved sister Phoebe?

The Catcher in the Rye was a very provocative and daring story for its time. Even though it was published in 1945, it feels very current. Teenagers could relate to Holden and his feelings of pressure, depression, rebellion, and being misunderstood. He acts like many teen-aged boys today by obsessing over girls and using profanity ever time he opens his mouth. I found that the story was very compelling. It is not difficult to read and very enjoyable. I would recommend this book to any young adult who wants a good reading experience.
