On February 8th of 2013, CJSHS participated in Cortland's first annual P.S. I Love You Day. This day was created by a Long Island high school senior named Brooke DiPalma, who has made it her mission to ensure that nobody is ever alone. DiPalma merely wants to let everybody know that they are loved and supported, and that everybody has a support network here for them, regardless of the group they are part of in school. After losing her father to suicide in 2010, Brooke took the last words she shared with her father and tried to turn this devastating event into a campaign to help others. Her message started virally with a **YouTube video** (today it has over 63,000 views), and the event is now celebrated as far away as England. In order to participate in this day, Brooke simply asks everyone to wear purple to represent standing up against bullying.
