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Reading and Writing News



Mrs. Snyder

In small group, we are working on answering not only literal questions, but inferential questions as well. We will begin referring to these two types of questions as "fat" and "skinny" questions. Good readers ask both types of questions to themselves as they read.

~Please keep reading. It is hard to believe that we are already at the halfway point for the 3rd grading period. Students should have earned approximately 50% of their AR points for the quarter already. Students who are behind on their reading read with Mrs. Snyder at recess on Thursdays.~

The Cay, by Theodore Taylor is the book we are currently reading as a class. Mrs. Hutchinson shared her survival backpack in morning meeting. As an extension activity, students were asked to pack a hypothetical raft with 10 items they would like to bring, if they had been in Phillip and Timothy's situation. They made thoughtful choices and wrote reasons for bringing each item.

Students are also drawing pictures of their own version of the cay. We talk about how good readers form mental images in their heads, complete with details that the author depicts for us. We work hard to bring those images back each time we refer to the text.

Mrs. Rhyde

In Reading Workshop, we are working on recognizing organizational formats to assist in comprehension of informational texts. We are also focusing on identifying evidence and examples from a text to support our thinking about a main character in our reading.

In Writing Workshop, students continue to work on writing a personal narrative. Students wrote a variety of leads and chose their strongest lead to make their narrative even better. They also added physical details and figurative language to their writing. Next week, students will add personal thoughts and feelings, as well as dialogue. The students are becoming fantastic writers! They are noticing how much they can improve their writing when they take the time to practice many of the strategies they learned during our mini lesson meeting times.

Mr. Caravella

In Reading Workshop, we are focused on keeping up with our goal of reading at least 7 new chapter books at our reading level before the end of the guarter. At this point, students should have completed 3.5 new books. Students who are behind on reading will read at recess on Wednesdays and on Friday afternoons to catch up.

We have been exploring non-fiction texts and the text structures used by authors to organize their writing, such as sequence, cause/effect, problem/solution, question/answer, and compare/contrast. Identifying the text structure helps us better understand the information we read.

In guided reading, we continue to read Stargirl, by Jerry Spinelli, and Bridge to Terabithia, by Katherine Paterson. We continue to focus on identifying evidence and examples to support our thinking about these books.

We are also continuing our read-aloud of The Odyssey, retold by Geraldine McCaughrean. We have focused on identifying story elements, such as characters, setting, problems and solutions as we read about Odysseus' troubled journey home.
